Arbor Day

On December 5, 2023, Arbor Day was commemorated across six communities: Cite Musoka, Djosayi, Vanance, Muzeya, Kamoa Mission, and Tshiwisha. A total of 35 community members reaped the rewards of a donation comprising 550 orange saplings, 100 avocado and 50 mandarin trees. These fruit trees were planted near the homes of the residents.

This fruit tree planting initiative was part of a broader Livelihoods Restoration Program, aimed specifically at resettled communities, also known as Project-Affected Persons (PAPs). Responding to a request that emerged over the past two years, the PAPs expressed a keen interest in cultivating fruit trees to bolster biodiversity conservation, enhance food security, and to foster avenues for income generation.

This program has been crafted to extend its support over a three-year span, providing some local farmers with the opportunity to cultivate grafted fruit seedlings on the farmland. to extend its support over a three-year span, providing some local farmers with the opportunity to cultivate grafted fruit seedlings on the farmland. These grafted varieties, including oranges, mandarins, and avocados, are poised to yield fruit within two years of grafting and planting, offering a sustainable source of nourishment and economic benefit for the PAPs in the participating communities.

Coinciding with this initiative was the celebration of World Soil Day, also on December 5th. The theme for 2023, "Soil and Water: A Source of Life," encapsulates the essence of our planet's reliance on the relationship between these fundamental elements. These two sources provide a staggering 95 percent of the food consumed by humans and other species, thereby maintaining a balance in the ecosystem.

The day was officially launched by Dr. Guy Muswil. The event was a collaboration of efforts marking a memorable occasion in the communities, including Cite Mwilu.

The Mwilu Early Childhood Development center has been enhanced with the addition of a playground, designed to cater to the recreational needs of the 80 children enrolled at the school. Kamoa-Kakula has demonstrated its commitment to sustainability by utilizing recycled materials, which have been sourced both locally and from the Company's mining operations. These materials include repurposed tires and timber.

The newly constructed playground is a testament to the Company's dedication to providing a conducive and engaging environment for the children. It features an assortment of play structures such as a playhouse, a tactile sand area, an educational large abacus counter, swings, and hopscotch zones. All elements have been thoughtfully constructed and painted to offer a stimulating and enjoyable experience for the students.

Sustainable Livelihoods

Since its inception in 2010, Ivanhoe Mines has continuously fostered the growth of the Sustainable Livelihoods Program, championing a series of initiatives aimed at bolstering the capabilities of local farmers and entrepreneurs in the communities surrounding Kamoa-Kakula

Layers of Success

The construction of the new poultry house is now complete and is designed to house 2,500 point of lay hens. Owners of the Ndizi Salama banana plantation have benefited from the waste generated from the poultry house as they now use it as fertilizer to increase the yield of their crops.

At the banana plantation new, user friendly drip lines were installed in the third quarter covering nine hectares.

At the fishponds, a new deal was reached at with International Facilities Services (IFS) on the supply of fresh Tilapia by Communities. As a start up, a total of 3,000kgs of fresh Tilapia was supplied to IFS by eight community fish farmers.

Turning towards maize production, A total of 236 hectares of maize was planted by 340 farmers during the last quarter of .2023

AFor World AIDS Day, on December 1, approximately 250 local community members attended an AIDS educational event at the newly opened Kamoa Centre of Excellence. Kamoa Copper hosted the event to raise awareness on the spread of HIV, provide education on its prevention and offer testing.



Kipushi recorded a total of 3 lost time injuries during 2023, with a Lost Time Injury Frequency Rate (LTIFR) of 0.6 and a Total Recordable Injury Frequency Rate (TRIFR)³ of 1.7 for the year.



A Long Road Ahead

Road reconstruction efforts in Kipushi continued in the fourth quarter with the city witnessing significant progress since the commencement of road rehabilitation work in May. Spearheaded by KICO, the project's primary goal is to repair the dirt roads and improve traffic along the designated routes. This undertaking, a joint effort with the Haut-Katanga provincial government, is set to transform 10 kilometers of unpaved roads. As it stands, an eight kilometers have already been successfully rehabilitated.

KICO is at the forefront of a transformation in Kipushi, breathing new life into the city's road network. The initiative is a game-changer for local transportation; previously, navigating the area was a challenge, with vehicles struggling to traverse the severely deteriorated roads. Thanks to the rehabilitation efforts, some of which were carried out by the Provincial Government, mobility within the city is being restored, marking a new era of connectivity and efficiency.

APDI has focused on youth engagement and community development to drive this project. The initial phase involved an extensive clean-up of Mobutu Avenue, which established a benchmark for subsequent efforts. KICO's involvement transcends fiscal sponsorship, as they also supply vital resources necessary for the many tasks inherent in the project. These tasks, critical and transformative by nature, include the detailed clearing of drainage systems, effective waste and plastic removal, and visual enhancements such as street sweeping, lawn edging, and the application of fresh paint to infrastructure along principal routes.

In collaboration, KICO and APDI are not merely undertaking an urban sanitation task; they are revitalizing Kipushi by creating a cleaner, more sustainable community, instilling a sense of pride among the residents.
